LEAVING BEHIND DARKNESS TO FOLLOW THE LIGHT: LIVING LIKE THE SHEPHERDS

The Christmas narrative has always caught our minds and attention. We likely all know the story really well by now. Jesus is born in a manger, with no room at the inn, greeted by shepherds and (eventually) the magi. We know the narrative well.

But have we ever asked why. Why is this event important? Why did the event of Jesus' birth unfold the way it did?

More specifically, tonight's gospel asks the question - why the shepherds?

What was it in them which attracted the attention of the Angels? Were these shepherds learned, distinguished, or powerful? Were they especially known for piety and gifts? Nothing is said to make us think so.

Why were they chosen? The shepherds were chosen because of their poverty and obscurity, the place where God dwells this evening.

Why the shepherds? Because we are the shepherds.

Like the shepherds, our attention is limited to the things we can produce and display to others. We limit our desires to those things the world considers important and valuable. And then reality itself offers the chilling reminder that we are vulnerable, fragile, lowly.

But the situation of the shepherds, and by extension ourselves, does not end here. The shepherds are suddenly met by angels. The Angel appears and opens their minds - telling them not to be downcast or afraid, for God had chosen the poor in this world to be heirs of His kingdom.

But like the shepherds, this truth can make us a little afraid. When a little light is poured in our souls, the darkness is exposed. God's holiness, the greatness of His power, can frighten us. We would rather confidently walk around blind than see our vulnerability and lowliness clearly.

The shepherds in the Gospel were able to overcome their fear because they were able to verify the angels' message as true - that this 'light' brought joy.

This joy is the light of Christ - a light that is now both close and eternal through the Incarnation. Through the birth of Christ, our vulnerability, our lowliness is transformed into strength and power. The Light of Christ enters the darkest corners of the world - and it cannot be extinguished. No human project, no trial, no viral pandemic can destroy the power of the Incarnation. The sinfulness of our souls can distract ourselves from the light. We can try to ignore the message of glad tidings. But we cannot destroy the light - we cannot destroy the Incarnation itself - and the indelible mark it has placed on our souls as baptized.

Like the shepherds, we can leave behind what everyone else thinks and wants. We can leave behind the prevailing standards of our secular times. Like the shepherds, we can leave these things behind so that we may enter the light - the truth of our being. The star of Christmas night is Christ Himself - the light that shows the path through the streets of history.

Like the shepherds, we can leave behind our fear of this past year and embrace the joy that is found in the impenetrable light of Christ.
