## Reflection by Fr. Andrefw MAKING THE LITURGY 'LESS PELAGIAN' AGAIN

One obstacle that contemporary American Catholics create in being disposed to grace in the Liturgy is Pelagianism. Pelagianism was a heresy in the early Church named after a Celtic monk names Pelagius. He lived in the Christian City of Rome and later in North Africa between 390-418 AD. This monk taught that God's grace was not necessary for salvation, since human nature had not been truly corrupted by original sin. Our human weakness was due more to the environmental effect of bad example. Jesus' saving act was to offer an example of pure love that could be imitated. God's favor could be obtained by a kind of moral rigorism alone and outside of God's grace.

The most vigorous opponent of Pelagius was St. Augustine. We as Catholics share Augustine's belief that we have been deeply damaged by the rebellion of Adam and Eve, although not totally corrupted. This damaged human nature leaves us unable to achieve what is good without God's help. Original Sin refers to our fallen human condition, which leaves us prone to commit actual sin.

In other words, here's the bad news: we are broken, outside of a saving relationship with God, and we ourselves can do nothing about it. The highest human standard will always fall short of God's standard. We cannot merit it

The Good news is that God has not left us to our own devices, but has sent his Son to save us. The Good news of salvation resounds and is received as Good News only if we have truly grasped the bad news of our fallen condition. The news that I am cancer free really will mean nothing to me if I have never realized that I was cancer-ridden. The good news of being healed only resonated if I have truly accepted the bad news of my sickness.

Pelagianism paralyzes the believer's ability to receive the Good News precisely as Good News. The Pelagian lives with the mindset, whether they know it or not, that Jesus does not save, but simply inspire. In the end, I can save myself. A Pelagian Church is one that does not truly know the radical, scandalous mercy of God. Either we do not need to be forgiven, or forgiveness is not an option.

What would you say if you were to die tonight, appear before God, and be asked: "Why should I let you into heaven?" Most of us would mention all the kinds of things we do for God. All of our answers would be wrong - because it is not about what we have done, but what God has done for us.

Pelagianism in the Liturgy Today:

I have experienced many funerals that, rather than being a proclamation of the Good News of salvation through Jesus Christ, became instead a proclamation of the righteousness or goodness of the deceased. The Scriptures during the Mass are chosen to culogize the deceased rather than proclaim the grace of God's merciful love.

When we have pelagianistic tendencies, there are three consequences to how we approach the liturgy:

1. It will breed a culture of minimalism - which is more pagan than Christian

2. The Mercy of God cannot be fully known or experienced

3. No desire to missionary discipleship.
