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Why too much information can be bad for your soul

In an age of instant communication, with a wealth of information at our fingertips, our souls can easily be led astray.

Information is in general a good thing, especially if it concerns current events and helps us stay up-to-speed with the world around us.

However, it is possible to overdose on information and general knowledge, just as with food. We simply don't need to know everything, and sometimes too much information can harm our soul.

Thomas à Kempis in his Imitation of Christ, reflects on this notion of too much information:

Rest from inordinate desire of knowledge, for therein is found much distraction and deceit. Those who have knowledge desire to appear learned, and to be called wise. Many things there are to know which profits little or nothing to the soul.

Knowing many things can often make us seem like we know everything. This can lead to a certain pride and we may dive into social media comments with a pompous attitude, thinking that we are the wisest of all.

Furthermore, while it may be good to know what is going on in the world, there are other types of knowledge that could benefit us and our soul, as Kempis explains:

And foolish out of measure is he who attends upon other things rather than those which serve to his soul's health. Many words satisfy not the soul, but a good life refreshes the mind, and a pure conscience gives great confidence towards God.

If we are suffering from information glut, it might be time to reorder our priorities and seek information that will lift us up and benefit our soul.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

Always be prepared to welcome Christ, for we know neither the day nor the hour of his arrival.

The Gospel parable reminds us to keep vigil for Jesus. It is easy to get distracted by the details of work, family life, and other responsibilities so that we forget the real purpose and mission of our lives. Let's each take a moment to contemplate how we can live out our vocation in life, readying ourselves for the Lord's coming.

The first reading speaks of the attributes of wisdom, and the importance of the love of wisdom, as it is the perfection of prudence. In the second reading, Paul encourages people of faith to hold on to hope in the Resurrection. In the Gospel, Jesus tells a parable where five virgins were ready for the bridegroom and five were not. Those who were not ready missed out on the wedding feast.

"Q's from the Pews" What is / are Sacramentals?

There is a tendency to confuse Sacraments with Sacramentals. This can occur because Sacramentals include some of the same elements that sacraments do. They often will contain the elements of both Matter and a particular Form. "They always include a prayer (Form) often accompanied by a specific sign (Matter) such as the laying on of hands, the sign of the cross or the ...Holy water (which recalls baptism)." CCC 1668. Sacramentals "are sacred signs

(therefore) which bear a resemblance to the sacraments. They signify effects, particularly of a spiritual nature, which are obtained through the intercession of the Church." CCC 1667. One way to think of Sacramentals is as a special request for the Grace of the Holy Spirit to bless or strengthen a particular activity or situation. "They are instituted for the sanctification of certain ministries...and a great variety of circumstances in Christian life."

CCC 1668. Sacraments are instituted by Jesus to confer Sanctifying Grace, while Sacramentals flow from the yearnings of His Body the Church. Blessings are an example of Sacramentals. Unlike sacraments that are directed toward imparting Sanctifying

Grace to Individuals in order to bring about salvation. Sacramentals are meant to impart individual graces to strengthen one in a particular situation. So we may Bless a person embarking on a journey or new mission. On October 15th, Father Mowery imparted a Sacramental on all those involved in teaching the faith,

both Catechists and Parents. The Form he used was a formal prayer, and he raised his hands and blessed with the Sign of the Cross as the Matter. Another example would be the blessing of a home or the blessing of the throats on the feast of Saint Blaise. So Sacramentals are a blessing involving Form and Matter. There is a popular belief that blessed objects like a rosary or crucifix are Sacramentals. They ARE NOT, because they do not confer grace. Rather, they are sacred objects which help focus the person on piety. Looking at these objects as Sacramentals would be a form of 'magic' like the belief in good luck from a rabbit's foot. This is specifically rejected by the Catholic Church. One can value a blessed object but should never think of it as conferring special blessings.
