

BISHOP SENIOR'S STATEMENT REGARDING THE TERRORIST ATTACK ON ISRAEL

Bishop Timothy Senior, Bishop of Harrisburg, released the following statement on the terrorist attack against Israel and the continuing conflict in the Holy Land: Like many, I found myself lost for words when I heard of the horrific violence Hamas unleashed on our Israeli brothers and sisters. My heart is heavy as news reports continue to detail the evil being inflicted, with no regard for the welfare of innocent civilians, no regard for women, children, and the elderly. I join in echoing Pope Francis who said, "May the attacks and weaponry cease. Please! And let it be understood that terrorism and war do not lead to any resolutions, but only to the death and suffering of so many innocent people. I call on all people of our Diocese to pray without ceasing for all those killed, displaced, and impacted by this terrorist attack. We pray God will grant eternal rest to the deceased, console those grieving, comfort those in fear, and guide our world leaders so this conflict may be brought to an end. To the Jewish community in Central Pennsylvania, we stand in solidarity with you, praying that peace will come to the Holy Land

"O's from the Pews"

The role of the Permanent Deacon in the Church. (From Deacon Tom Conlin) The word deacon derives from the Greek diakonia. meaning "service," thereby indicating that a deacon is called, like Christ, to be a servant. The Order of Deacon has three essential functions: the proclamation of the Gospel, the service of the liturgy, and the administration of charitable works. Deacons may baptize, witness the exchange of vows and bless marriages, distribute Holy Communion, impart benediction with the Blessed Sacrament, bring Viaticum to the dying, read Sacred Scripture to the faithful and especially proclaim the Gospel, preach, officiate at funerals and burials, and administer the sacramentals. They should also dedicate themselves to other charitable works, particularly within the parish community. (the Catechism, No. 1569-70, and the Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, No 29). Unlike a priest, deacons cannot absolve sins in the Sacrament of Penance, offer the Mass or confect the Holy Eucharist, administer the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, or administer the Sacrament of Confirmation. In accord with the spirit of Vatican II, where a shortage of priests existed, permanent deacons are able to preside at worship services where a priest was not present or administer a parish without a resident pastor. Presently, about 23,000 men serve as permanent deacons, with about 15,000 living in the United States. Several similarities and differences exist between transitional and permanent deacons. Transitional deacons make the promise of celibacy at the time of their ordination. The permanent diaconate may be conferred upon married men as well as single. About 90 percent of permanent deacons are married. However, the discipline of celibacy would be retained and taken for a single man when ordained as a permanent deacon or accepted by the married permanent deacon upon the death of his spouse. For liturgical functions, all deacons wear an alb and a stole that crosses the chest from the left shoulder to the waist on the right side. For solemn occasions, they also wear the dalmatic. However, unlike transitional deacons, permanent deacons normally do not wear regular clerical attire. Unlike transitional deacons who are obliged to fulfill the liturgy of the hours daily, permanent deacons in the United States are bound to offer morning and evening prayer only. The Order of Deacon, therefore, is part of the hierarchy of the Church and an integral part of the Sacrament of Holy Orders. The special benefit of the permanent diaconate has been in those areas of the Church where a shortage of priests exists. All deacons should heed the words of St. Polycarp: "Let them be merciful, and zealous, and let them walk according to the truth of the Lord, who became the servant of all" (Letter to the Philippians).
